Was Desus Raised from the Dead?

In a recent dialogue with theologian Craig Blomberg, skeptic Carl Stecher maintained that the resurrection of Jesus is nothing more than a myth perpetuated by people who were experienced hallucinations and/or misinterpreted events reported to them. Stecher writes:

The case for the resurrection as an historic fact, besides the weakness of the biblical evidence, opens up myriad other problems suitable for other debates, none of which exist in the much simpler and more plausible natural explanations.

Blomberg responds sagely. Declaring something *not to be* so has no more validity than declaring it *to be so.* He cites Grant Osborne's nine-fold argument for the historicity of the post-resurrection accounts of Jesus's appearance. While there's not room to recount this argument here, Osborne concludes:

It is clear that the disciples were radically changed by these events, and they and the early church believed Jesus had visibly appeared to them after his death. They also presented this material as realistic historical claims and not as fictive legends. So many details (the women as witnesses, their doubt and fear, the misunderstandings) would never have been told this way if they were simply made up.

While we should not be ashamed of admitting that belief in the resurrection requires faith, it is also true that those who do not accept the resurrection must act in faith as well. As Blomberg reminds us:

We have an unbroken tradition of reflection on the meaning of the resurrection from the pre-Pauline confession of faith in 1 Corinthians 15, most likely composed no later than a year or two after Jesus' death, all the way through to the twenty-first century today. And countless lives have been changed for the better because of it over those centuries.
