The Persians and Esther

The Book of Esther records events that occur in Susa, one of the four capitals of the ancient Achaemenid Persian empire (559–330 BC). The Persians were a nomadic people who lived what is Iran today. Under Cyrus the Great, they conquered the Babylonian kingdom in 559 BC and ruled over a kingdom reaching "from India to Kush" (Esther 1:1) until the rise of Alexander the Great.

Because there were several Persian empires through history, this first empire is called the Achaemenid. The kings took the title Šāhe Šāhān, literally "King of Kings" (Ezra 7:12; Dan 2:37), because they ruled over many people who once had kings but now were under him.

The portrayal of the Achaemenid court in Susa in Esther is accurate, indicating that it was most likely written soon after the events recorded in the book. Unlike the Assyrians and Babylonians before them, the Persians were very tolerant of the people they conquered. They allowed exiled people to return to their homelands and even rebuild their capitals and religious sites, as they did with the Jews in the books of Ezra and Nehemiah. This was foretold centuries before by the prophet Isaiah, who said Cyrus would be God's anointed one (Isa 44:28–45:1).

Esther's Hebrew name was Hadassah ("myrtle") but like most Jews living in Babylonian or Persian settings, she was given a second name, rooted in the name of the ruling culture's pantheon of deities. (The same happened with Daniel and his companions Hananiah, Mishael, and Azariah. Esther is really the Akkadian *Ishtar*, probably pronounced stāreh in Persian. Although there is no extra biblical evidence for a Jewish queen named Esther, there is also no evidence *disproving* that she existed. Achaemenid kings could have many wives, and these wives often had many titles, so it is entirely possible that Esther appears in their records under a different name.
