In 1938, the accomplished pianist Julius Chajes fled his native Austria when it was annexed into the German Third Reich. As a Jew, he rightfully feared for his life. He settled in Chicago and began composing music for Reformed synagogues. This song is a loose adaptation of the traditional Hebrew prayer Aleinu leshabei'ach ("it is our duty to praise God"). The second verse, which explicitly praises Jesus as Lord and God, was added by when the song was adopted by churches.

Shepherds in the Fields

The Lighting of the Advent Candle

Today, we light this third candle in rejoicing that He is our God. Shepherding was once the most important job in ancient Israel. Sheep eat just about anything and in return, they provide wool, dairy products, and meat at a very low cost. By the time of Jesus's birth though, shepherds had become marginalized from society. God had not forgotten that he called himself Israel's shepherd, and so he announced his Son's birth to lowly shepherds.

'He who scattered Israel will gather him, and will keep him as a shepherd keeps his flock.' For the Lord has ransomed Jacob and has redeemed him from hands too strong for him. They shall come and sing aloud on the height of Zion, and they shall be radiant over the goodness of the Lord, over the grain, the wine, and the oil, and over the young of the flock and the herd; their life shall be like a watered garden, and they shall languish no more. Then shall the young women rejoice in the dance, and the young men and the old shall be merry. I will turn their mourning into joy; I will comfort them, and give them gladness for sorrow. I will feast the soul of the priests with abundance, and my people shall be satisfied with my goodness, declares the Lord. (Jeremiah 31:10–14)

In 1751, the English hymnist John Francis Wade wrote an adaptation of a medieval Latin hymn, Adeste fideles. His hymn was translated into English by C. Frederick Oakeley in 1845. Oakeley was not a rigid ritualist, and he believed there was great value in adding new elements to worship, and so he included songs like this one in the worship.

Louis Giglio was preaching on Revelation 4, and as Tomlin reflected on the eternal worship in heaven, he sought to write something reflective of that here on earth.

Joseph's Five Declarations

There are five moments in Matthew 1-2 when Joseph, Mary's husband and Jesus's adopted father, declares Jesus to be the Christ.

- (1) Joseph adopted Jesus as the Son of David (1:25, cf. 2 Samuel 7:16).
- (2) Jesus was born in Bethlehem, the city of David (2:1, cf. Micah 5:2).
- (3) Jesus came up from Egypt (2:15, cf. Hosea 11:1)
- (4) An evil king attempted to thwart God's purposes (2:18, cf. Jeremiah 31:5).
- (5) The identification of the "branch" with Nazareth (2:23, cf. Isaiah 11:1).

Hark the Herald Angels Sing

Perhaps no Christmas Carol had a more curious path to us than this one. When Charles Wesley first penned the song in 1739, he called it "Hymn for Christmas-Day" and its opening line was "Hark! How all the Welkin rings." His friend and fellow preacher, George Whitefield, changed the first line to the more familiar form we know today. The song was also originally sung to the same tune as another of Wesley's hymns, "Christ the Lord is Risen Today. In 1855, William Hayman Cummings realized it could also be sung to the tune of Vaterland in deinen Gauen, a tune from Felix Mendelssohn's Fesgesang, a cantata that was written to celebrate the 400th anniversary of the moveable type press.
